"You will, perhaps, remember that a good many years ago, you were kind enough to arrange for me to meet the late Prof. Breasted. Our meeting took place on the platform of a train in the Grand Central Station and although it was very brief, it was long enough for an interesting exchange of ideas. He told me then that he hoped sometime to excavate a site at which the Hittite civilization met the Greek and that if he did so, he would like to call upon me to head the undertaking. His intention, which remained unfulfilled has now actually been fulfilled by our work at Tarsus. For we found this year a sealed deposit in which there were both Hittite royal seals, a Hittite royal deed and Mycenaean pottery, much of which was imported from the Greek mainland. This is what archaeologists have been eagerly expecting of Tarsus and I think on the whole that it represents the most significant contribution of the 1936 campaign."

Miss Goldman's forecast is that the Tarsus excavation should be completed in four years at a cost estimated to be \$35,000 or \$36,000. Informs him that since it is apparent Harvard will not cooperate further in financing the Tarsus work, a sum of \$7000 is involved. He does not say for what period of time. He thinks that Eryn Maur makes a contribution of \$2500 when the work starts.

Harvard will not cooperate any further, "and in fact during all of the years that Betty has been excavating in the name of Harvard, that

Betty's plans for the future cover four years requiring \$36,000. Bryn Mawr has committed itself to \$2,500 ~~annually~~ a year for two years which together with Julius's contribution makes \$25,000. He does not know whether Bryn Mawr will continue to contribute. He believes the Archeological Institute of America will decide whether to pay something toward the costs, and thinks it will be about \$10,000, leaving \$1,000 to be made up. He does not wish to make any further contributions at the present time to the Institute, but in his will is leaving a provision that any amount needed to raise the \$36,000 will come out of his estate in the event of his death.

Goldman writes to ask whether or not the \$20,000 he contributed to the Institute for the excavations of his daughter are exempt from taxation on charity account.

Fleener replies, February 17, 1936, that the Institute is exempt from taxation as it is an institute operating in the field of higher education and without profit. Our imports in the way of books, and so on, are admitted free of duty because of the character of the Institute. Therefore, he concludes that Julius Goldman does not have to pay income tax on the amount contributed toward his daughter's excavations to the Institute.

When I replied Flexner had apparently not been released from promise of secrecy she calmed down. Then I asked her if disclosure was made subsequently--no, she said, it wasn't. Should it be made now? No, she said. She said I. A. S. did not pay any expenses of excavation which took her one-half of each year, without which understanding she wouldn't have come to Institute. After all, she had Fogg. Aydelotte quotes Miss Goldman as saying the lack of funds for stipends in the School of Humanistic Studies makes it most natural that those who come come on foundation funds. This involves acceptance by the Institute of the people the foundations choose and sometimes even the subjects to which they give preference. "It would be quite easy for the Institute gradually and by imperceptible steps to become a kind of guest house of the foundations. Our vigilance will undoubtedly prevent this, but adequate funds of our own would entirely eliminate the danger."

Aydelotte to Haass, November 2, 1944, transmitting the terms of Miss Goldman's will which makes the Institute residuary legatee. The property received by it to be held in a separate fund--"fund for Anatolian research" shall ultimately use all of such property, both principle and income for exploration and excavation in the field of classical and prehistoric archeology in the region indicated by the title of the fund with due regard to the allocation of adequate sums for publication in connection with every enterprise undertaken. The fund is to be administered by a committee to consist of Benjamin D. Meritt, William F. Albright, and a third member to be selected by them. In the event of the death of any member either of them, ^{or} the fund shall have been wholly expended, then the surviving members are to appoint a successor. "It is my wish and I direct that at all times, at least one, preferably two, but not three, members of the committee be also members of the Faculty of the School of Humanistic Studies."

An agreed clause modifying it suggested, "only to the power of the Trustees of the Institute for Advanced Study at any time or from time to time in their uncontrolled judgment and discretion to withhold funds in any case where they deem a proposed expenditure not to be in accordance with the purpose for which this fund is established."

Goldman to Aydelotte, October 16, 1945.

She says that at the time she came to the Institute, she had begun the excavations of Tarsus under the auspices of Bryn Mawr College, the Archaeological Institute of America and Harvard University.

When the war broke out in 1939, neither the excavation nor the study of material had been completed, though a large part of the program had been fulfilled. She brought home to America full notes, architectural plans and photographs to write, in collaboration with others who had worked as her students and assistants at the dig, the first volume covering the later Greek and Roman periods. This volume, to which the Institute as you will remember has contributed \$3,000 and to which the Archaeological Institute of America has promised to make a contribution, is now in the hands of the Princeton Press.

By the end of 1945-46 the second volume, covering the more ancient periods from about 3000 B. C. to 600 B. C. will be ready in preliminary form and it will then be necessary for her to return to Tarsus and complete the volume by making a more intensive study of the material left in storerooms at the site. She asks for leave during the academic year 1946-7 in order to complete the studies, since here are still the first in Anatolia, she feels a professional obligation to complete them.

Aydelotte to Goldman, October 7. He is about to retire.

"...mathematicians are doing still more astounding things and have actually something like 75 members in mathematics and mathematical physics coming this year. The result is, of course, that the Institute is impossibly crowded. Would you have any objection to one or two people working in your room until such time as you return when they could be removed to the library. The whole question of emeritus members (which class I join on October 16) is getting to be a little embarrassing, in view of the unprecedented demands on Institute space. I have established myself in Lowe's quarters in a quite small room which

Gil Stott and I share. I did not want to be in the position of occupying a large space. At the same time, I feel very strongly that the Institute would lose a lot if it did not provide dignified quarters for members emeritus; and I intend to maintain that point of view vigorously in the meetings of the Board of Trustees. Of course, the only real thing to do is to build some additional buildings with small rooms for members; and meanwhile we must just get on as best we can, but I think it is desirable to allow temporary use of any room that may be vacant."

He notes that the School of Humanistic Studies is doing well. Homer Thompson is on the job, "and tomorrow we are presenting for the second time to the faculty the nomination of Cherniss." Previously Miss Goldman has thanked Dr. Aydelotte for the successful arrangements with Datus Smith at the Princeton Press for the publication of her book.

She is recovering from operation for a brain tumor.
