Datus C. Smith asks Aydelotte if he is able to predict any kind of schedule for the manuscript of the Vision of Cecil Rhodes, and notes that with the war situation there is a special urgency to publish the book promptly. (Smith to Aydelotte, March 10, 1942, File II-6.)

Aydelotte responds. "The Vision of Cecil Rhodes would have been ready for you this spring had it not been for the war, and the whole question is how much time my war duties will take this summer." With time ~~incommensurate~~ he could finish in about a month's time. No further reference to this in the file. (File II-6.)

Excerpts from File II-6.

The Princeton Press was urging Dr. Aydelotte to find the funds wherewith to publish the books ready for publication from the pen of Panofsky and de Tolnay. The Panofsky work was planned as two volumes, the first The Life and Work of Albrecht Durer and the second A Hand List of All the Works By, Ascribed to, and Copied After Durer. The de Tolnay on Michelangelo was estimated to cost ~~between~~ approximately \$3580; the additional costs for publication and so forth brought the estimate up to a little over \$4000 for certain types and \$4500 for another type.

Both de Tolnay and Panofsky appealed to the American Council of Learned Societies for subvention for the publication of these books. On Dec. 22, 1941 Donald Goodchild, Secretary for *grants-in-aid* of the A.C.L.S. responded advising that the Council could give to Panofsky not the \$2500 requested but \$1250, and to de Tolnay not the \$2000 requested but \$1000, and both with the understanding that the Council made no grants providing even indirectly for the author's royalties. The total amount of the grant was to be used for the cost of manufacturing. The Council required the contract to be drawn with the Princeton University Press embodying that restriction. "If the Institute has a different policy in this matter we of course should ^{not} want to interfere; I do not believe that the restriction placed on the use of our funds will hamper your field in finding supplementary grants required." (Goodchild to Aydelotte, Dec. 12, 1941, File II-6.)

The Princeton Press had offered to print the Panofsky book with no intention of profit; after expenses were met (the actual manufacturing cost of the book plus actual costs in connection with promotion) the excess income would go into a fund to

aid the publication of future Institute books. This was done because of Panofsky's eminence in the field and in the hope that there would be a recovery of the full subsidy and also an actual increase above the subsidy. (Datus C. Smith, Jr., Editor Princeton University Press to Aydelotte, Nov. 3, 1941.)

Aydelotte replies Nov. 4, 1941 that the Institute has not been able to find the \$3000 and is not optimistic.

Smith writes to Panofsky (Nov. 6, 1941) saying that he would like with Panofsky's consent to go back to his Board of Trustees to see what proposal they would make if the book were considered like any other book and entirely apart from the proposed Institute's publishing fund. He could take the matter up on Nov. 26th at the next meeting of his Board of Trustees. He says "As you know it would be possible to manufacture the book for less than the estimated \$5200 that we have been discussing, but the smaller type, less generous format, and so forth, seem to me to be unworthy of this book, which demands the handsomest publication it can be given." (Smith to Panofsky Nov. 6, 1941, File II-6.) He advises Aydelotte of this communication.

at the Carnegie Foundation

On Dec. 10th Aydelotte appeals to Flexner/[?]to support an appeal to the Carnegie for subvention to permit publication [?]for the book. Here is the request as made: The Press is quite reasonably asking for a subvention of \$2500 for the Panofsky book and \$2000 for the de Tolnay; the A.C.L.S. has offered to contribute one-half but the Institute cannot find the money to ^{supply}~~take~~ the rest of the subvention. (Aydelotte to Dr. Charles Dollard, Carnegie Corporation, 522 Fifth Ave. and Abraham Flexner, same address, Dec. 10, 1941, File II-6.)

Panofsky was to recover only \$300 representing the actual cost to him for photographs, etc. for the book. (Smith to Aydelotte, Dec. 17, 1941, Ibid.)

addition of

Carnegie Institute made the required \$2250 for both works available to the A.C.L.S. Committee with the understanding that further requests would not be granted for the Institute which must in the future look elsewhere for funds for the output of its art scholars "as it does for research in other fields." (Dollard to Aydelotte, Jan. 4, 1942, File II-6.)
