

Will you please authorize payment of \$1500 from the travel-allowance allowed me for the last fiscal year, none of which I have yet drawn upon, and for the current year to defray the expenses of my recent trip to Europe? I went to Copenhagen to attend the Second International Congress of Classical Studies and to take part in the meeting of the International Curatorium of the Archive of Greek Lexicography, of which I am the American member; and with this trip I combined trips to Oxford to discuss with British scholars the institution of a new international journal for ancient philosophy and to Paris to talk with Festugière and Victor Goldschmidt about problems in the history of Platonism concerning which the three of us have been writing as well as to explore the possibility of promising candidates for temporary membership in the Institute among the younger French scholars in the field of ancient philosophy.
