

Princeton, N.J. - The Institute for Advanced Study announced today the election of Dr. Marvin Goldberger as its new Director. Dr. Goldberger will take office in September 1987, after stepping down from his present position as President of the California Institute of Technology.

James D. Wolfensohn, Chairman of the Institute's Board of Trustees, said, "Marvin Goldberger is a magnificent choice. It is rare to find a person who combines the talents of an outstanding scholar and an experienced administrator. Dr. Goldberger is such an individual. He is one of the nation's best known research physicists and has been, for the past nine years, president of one of the nation's great universities."

Thornton Bradshaw, Chairman of the Search Committee, said, "It is easy to see why Dr. Goldberger was the unanimous choice of the Board and of the faculty. We are all delighted that our search has been successful and that there will be a smooth transition at the commencement of our next academic year."

Professor John Bahcall, an Institute faculty representative to the committee, commented, "The search united the faculty and trustees of the Institute in a joint effort to find a brilliant academician who was also a distinguished administrator, someone who understood and could share the excitement of history, social science, math and physics. We didn't expect to find anyone who satisfied all of our requirements. But we did."

Dr. Goldberger will succeed the Institute's current Director, Harry Woolf. Dr. Woolf, who was appointed in 1976, will spend the coming year as a fellow of Churchill College, Cambridge University, England. Thereafter, he plans to return to the Institute as a professor. Mr. Wolfensohn said of the outgoing Director, "Under Harry's direction the Institute achieved significant growth and development in all dimensions. He can be very proud of the contribution he has made to this great institution and the Board and the faculty are grateful to him and to his wife, Pat."

Dr. Goldberger is the sixth director of the Institute in a distinguished line following Abraham Flexner, Frank Aydelotte, Robert Oppenheimer, Carl Kaysen and Harry Woolf. Prior to his election as President of Caltech, Dr. Goldberger was chairman of the Physics Department of Princeton University. Born in Chicago, Illinois in 1922, Dr. Goldberger received his undergraduate degree from the Carnegie Institute of Technology in 1943 and his PhD from the University of Chicago in 1948. He was a professor of physics at the University of Chicago until 1957, when he was appointed as Higgins Professor of Mathematical Physics at Princeton University. He has published widely in the field of elementary particle physics and has received numerous awards and academic honors. He served as a member of the President's Science Advisory Committee from 1965 to 1969. He has been active in international security and arms control issues in connection with the National Academy of Sciences, of which he is a member. Dr. Goldberger serves on the Board of Directors of General Motors Corporation.

Dr. Goldberger is married to Mildred Goldberger, an economist. They have two sons.

Commenting on his election by the Institute, Dr. Goldberger said, "I am delighted with the opportunity to head a great institution where I have had the privilege of being a working member on many occasions. I have the utmost respect for its traditions and achievements and look forward to working with its distinguished faculty, members and Board to ensure its continued position at the forefront of the intellectual life of our country."

The Institute for Advanced Study is an independent institution devoted to the encouragement, support and patronage of learning. It was founded in 1930 with initial faculty appointments in the fields of mathematics and mathematical physics. Its distinguished professors have included Albert Einstein, John von Neumann, André Weil, Kurt Gödel, Erwin Panofsky, George Kennan, Albert Hirschman and many others. Today, it has four schools--School of Historical Studies, School of Mathematics, School of Natural Sciences and School of Social Science. The Institute's permanent faculty at present is made up of 24 professors, all scholars of special distinction in their fields. Each year approximately 160 Visiting Members from throughout the world are invited to continue their work at the Insitute for periods of one semester to two years.

The Institute is located in Princeton, New Jersey. It maintains no administrative ties with Princeton University, but the two institutions enjoy a close and cooperative academic relationship.
