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Dr. Flexner reported in part:

".... A great many applications for admission to the Institute have been received, most of them lying in fields outside the field of pure mathematics. These have necessarily been declined. A small number, whose interests coincide with that of the group above mentioned, have been accepted. I am amxious that the first year the number of students shall be small in order to give the members of the staff an exportantly to work out their plans in cooperation with one another. The continued financial depression makes it unlikely that at this moment we will be troubled with an excessive number of acceptable applications. It may be, however, that a few students highly qualified may apply who will need some form of financial assistance. To this end the budget contains an item of \$5,000 to be expended in part or whole by the Director on the recommendation of the mathematical staff to aid young workers to continue beyond the Ph.D. degree. No one, who has not received the Ph.D. degree from an institution of high standing, has as yet been considered qualified for admission."

John R. Hardin to Charles R. Hardin, February 24, 1934.

Asks him to prepare necessary papers to present to the Board of Education of New Jersey for the granting of authority to grant degrees. (Directed by the Board meeting in January, 1934).

"The Institute is actually in going order with a fully equipped School of Mathematics, which has already received international recognition. It is located at Princeton, and has a staff of five professors. There are twenty-one students (they style them 'workers'). Two of them have Ph. D. degrees.

All the others have already been teaching. Some of them have reached the rank of associate professors or assistant professor in the most prominent institutions of this country and Europe. They have been at work for as much as eight or ten years, during which they have made notable contributions to mathematics ... In They are variously financed. Some of them pay their own way entirely and a tuition fee besides. Others are sent by the National Research Council. to which the Rockefeller Foundation makes an appropriation for the purpose; others by the Rockefeller Foundation; still others have been granted leave of absence on half pay by their own institutions, despite the fact that these institutions are hard pressed financially, and in these instances the Institute has made a grant-in-aid. Others grantsin-aid have been made and will be made. Plans for other schools are under consideration, as well as for permanent buildings, etc. "

"The Director reported that he had received a letter, dated July21, 1934, from Mr. Charles H. Elliott, Commissioner of Education of New Jersey, stating that the State Board of Education had granted the Institute for Advanced Study a license to confer the degree of Doctor of Philosophy upon those students who complete programs of study leading to that degree which are similar in scope to those offered in leading American universities. The Director explained that it was no part of the policy of the Institute to confer degrees, earned or honorary, but that following the advice of Mr. Hardin it seemed wise to obtain permission to do so, even though no use of the permission was contemplated."

They have had a conference Eisenhart, Veblen, and Flexner and Flexner has gone over again the four bulletins which have already been published.

He quotes from Bulletin No. 2, page 1, and says that in subsequent bulletins the following specific statement is made:

"In some fields universities provide admirable opportunities for work beyond the Ph. D. degree, but with the exception of medicine and certain other branches, the country has not hitherto possessed an institution in which young men and women could continue their independent training beyond this stage, and in which research could be carried on with adequate

support without pressure of numbers or routine, and unbried by the need of obtaining practical results."

He said the reference to medicine embraced the Rockefeller Institute, "and to some extent similar facilities are available in a few medical schools. Dean Eisenhart's suggestion masking that in the future the Institute should enroll only post-doctoral students, therefore, harmonizes with the statements which have been printed, although a few exceptions, not on reflection worthwile, have previously been made.

Flexner was opposed to the multiplication of rules and regulations. He thinks that the question of importance attached to degrees is one which cannot be answered in such a way as to make sure that one is doing in every individual case the wisest possible thing. He cites Johns Hopkins as holding to the rule that admission is restricted to me holders of the A. B. Degree, though there were worthy persons equally fit to enter the school who had not yet obtained the degree. In the same way the Rockefeller Institute has followed the practice of admitting only persons who have obtained the M. D. Degree

Oppenheimer raised a question with the faculty of granting doctoral degrees. Veblen expressed himself as flatly opposed on the ground that there would be so few that each would have an excessive value. I asked Oppenheimer what made him suggest it. He said that when he came to Princeton he was helping three or four University of California men with their doctoral theses. They were at the Institute. He would have liked to give them a degree from the Institute, and this was the sole reason for which he raised the question. He came to see later, he said, that it would not be a good thing because of the limitation of the fields, etc., and because, mainly because, the Institute was not set up to handle graduate work. At first he misunderstood the question and said, "Oh, you mean that time I all that hassle about my saying the Institute was an educational institution . and I said, no I didn't mean that. This was a specific reference to degrees. He didn't remember it, but

The Director asked the faculty before meeting again to consider the question of granting doctorate degrees at the Institute. The charter permitted this to be done. The Director asked the faculty to consider any dangers they might see in the practice. Professor Veblen pointed out that if just a few degrees were given they would have an excessive value, and stated he would be opposed. The matter was to be discussed at the next faculty meeting.
