"Since Professor Pauli may not come until the Spring of 1949, and the arrival of Professor Tukawa in the fall of 1948 is uncertain, the Director suggested inviting Professor Uhlenbeck as Visiting Professor for the whole term 1948-1949 with a compensation of \$4,000 or \$5,000. The Director briefly sketched Professor Uhlenbeck's work as one of the discoverers of the spin of the electron. He felt this appointment would strengthen the group of physicists now at the Institute

"The Faculty, concurring with the School of Mathematics, has recommended the appointment of Professor Montgomery to a five-year membership. The School recommended that \$8,000 be made available for full time, and something less if Montgomery spends part time elsewhere..." He is only 38 but the School feels it knows him better that anyone who has been appointed and strongly endorsed his work.

The Director was empowered to extend these two invitations.

Carter to a school secretary I. A. B., January 10, 1941, commending MissUtley to the School of Economics and Politics just after the publication of her book, Japan's Feet of Clay.

"I met her first when she was working in the Academy of Science in Noscow many years ago. At that time her attitude toward the Soviet Union was one of excited and expectant inquiry. Then her Soviet husband got into trouble and passed out of circulation. I never happened to hear whether the fault was his own or that of the Soviet system.

"Quite naturally the incident resulted in a profound shift in Miss Utley's attitude toward the U. S. S. R. Of course, Mr. Joseph Stalin rates about as high with Miss Utley as General Robert Lee would have rated with the Pifth Ayenue deb during the Civil War if her newly married husband had been sent to Libby Frison and then completely lapsed into silence."
