Sarton to Flexner, September 6, 1933, informing Flexner of word which he has had from Neugebauer at Göttingen that he is editing the Corpus of all the original documents of Babylonian mathematics. Sarton says the world will owe much to Neugebauer for this.

Sarton suggests the history of science as one of the fields for the Institute to study; first because it has been neglected by other agencies except for the Carnegie Institution, and because when colleges that do give courses in it, it debases the subject rather than elevating it. Furthermore, because the history of science, that is, the history of mathematics and other sciences down the scale, is the best introduction to the philosophy of science and synthetic knowledge; next, because it is the best means of humanizing science; and, last, because

it would be an excellent preparation for increasing groups of people needing a general scientific knowledge and intelligence rather than a specialized and technical knowledge.

The organization of such studies in the United States could be reconciled with the urgent needs of many German scholars -- a new opportunity to them, a great opportunity to this country.

Then he goes on to compare himself with Neugebauer, in relation to whom he said he, Sarton, was only a dilettante. "He works in the front trenches while I amuse myself way back in the reer--praising the one, blaming the others; saying this ought to be done, etc.--and doing very little myself. What Neugebauer does is fundamental, and what I do, secondary."

He assures Flem or Neugebauer did not ask him towrite the letter.

"I return herewith the letter from Weyl and the correspondence with Br. Rleick. I have kept the copy of your letter to Dr. Zangger but I will return it if you wish. I should think this letter would put Weyl at his ease as far as it is possible to do so. His fear that he would have to take over the Directorship of the Institute at Gottingen is probably well founded for Bohr's information that Courant has been 'given a leave of ebsence' seems to be quite definite. I have suggested Courants's name in a couple of places where they need a man to build up a mathematics department. He would be ideal for such an undertaking.

"I think it very likely that Neugebauer will also be dismissed because he is well known as a radical in politics. I believe it is quite true that he occupies a unique position as an historian of mathematics.

"I am going to talk with Taylor of our Chemistry Department about Farkas. I seem to remember that the chemists think very highly of him. I suppose you noticed in the morning paper that Haber himself has resigned.

"I can't help returning to the point that if the funds could be made available, now would be a golden opportunity for starting some of the other departments. But this idea is so obvious that you have doubtless already considered it from all points of view.

"Mrs. Bailey's account of the grants in aid in her letter of May 3rd agrees entirely with my notes on the subject except that there should also be set agide \$1200 for travelling and extra expenses in the case of Pontriagin. You will recollect that we agreed with lefschetz that a total of \$3000 should be available for this case and we decided to make the stipend small in order to have a good large reserve on account of the pecularities in his situation. Contrary to what I wrote in one of my letters last week, this means that we have now disposed of \$500 out of our additional \$5000."

"Aydelotte telephoned me yesterday that Bresden had had a letter from Weyl from the Italian Tyrol. He says that/is as good as settled that Courant will go to Cambridge, which is a little less certain than your telegram, which arrived shortly after. If this is correct, my disposition would be to invite Neugebauer, because he would bring to this country something absolutely new, namely, the historical and humanistic side of mathematics. Mathematics is something more than an affair of today and yesterday. It is a part of the cultural history of the race. Sarton has been urging me to do this and in speaking of Neugebauer as compared with himself says that he (Sarton) is a mere ameteur compared with Neugebauer."

He recites some of Heugebauer's history. He founded the Zentralblat fur Mathematik in Göttingen in 1931 as a professor of mathematics, and from the beginning the Zentralblat has been published by Julius Springer of Berlin, one of a number published by Julius Springer in various fields of science. "From the beginning, it has served a useful purpose in bringing together in convenient form the suitable criticism all the published mathematical work of the world." It has a distinguished part of editors, a large number of collaborators and reviewers, most of them are, of themselves mathematicisms of some distinction. After the

Nazis come into power in Germany, Mougebauer was perhaps the leading historian in mathematics, moved to Copenhagen and continued to edit the Zentralblat. The Springer Publishing House in Berlin was subjected to pressure by the Mazis. Springer dropped the distinguished Italian mathematician, Levi-Civita, from the list of associate editors without consulting Neugebauer, and replied to Neugebauer's question about it that it was the consequence of anti-semetic degrees in Italy. Springer added that Neugebauer must give him before the first of December a formal engagement that no article by a German author would be reviewed by an emigré. Neugebauer resigned as of December 1, and was followed by a number of the associate editors. A large number of the collaborators has resigned. Springer has replaced Neugebauer by an obscure mathematician named Ulrich.

Veblen resigned from the Board, brought the situation to the attention of Mr. Meppel of Carnegie. Mr. Weaver of the Rockefeller Foundation. Both were interested in Neugebauer as well as in the problem of the Zentralblat. Neugebauer has been appointed to a Chair in the History of Mathematics at Brown University where it is hoped that he will be able to

continue his researches in this field under favorable auspices. Carnegic Corporation has authorized its president, "to commit the corporation to a grant of not more than \$66,000 to permit the establishment in this country of an international journal of mathematics on the presentation of a satisfactory plan of operation." Veblen says that \$6,000 is to be used in establishing Neugebauer at Brown, and the remainsing \$60,000 for the new journal. Neugebauer will collaborate in setting up the new journal, but will not necessarily be its permanent editor.

Veblen told Reppell that the grant for the new journal should be available on a diminishing scale during the first ten years of the journal's existance. Reppell peplied that the corporation did not want to prescribe the manner in which the money should be used, but Vancevar Bush, President of Carnegie Institution, is interested in the project and competent to understand the details.

The American Mathematical Society appointed a committee consisting of professors C. R. Adams, Chairman, G. & C. Birkhoff,

A. V. Coble, T. C. Fry, M. Morse, and G. T. Whyburn to study the problem in detail, and if they found it desirable to take the necessary steps toward founding a new journal.

Purther details in the letter on the estimated cost of publication of the journal, which Veblen estimates will be between\$15,000 and \$20,000 a year. For this, there will be available \$60,000 fronthe Carnegie Corporation which can legitimately be used up over a period of 10 years. He thinks it would be good to get an equal subvention from the Bockefeller Foundation. Also, therefould be income from subscriptions, and some form of subvention from the American Mathematical Society (\$1,000 a year has been proposed, but Veblen thinks \$2,000 a year is more like it), a subvention from the Mathematical Association of America (an organization on the collegiate rather than the University level), and subventions from other mathematical and scientific societies in various parts of the world, and from fim neigh and philanthropic foundations.

"As a part of aprojected plan to encourage bonds between the Schools, the appointment of Dr. Otto Reugebauer was discussed. The invitation was to come from the School of Mathematics but it had the cordial concurrence of the School of Rumanistic Studies. Dr. Neugebauer's work in the prehistory period of mathematics was considered a practical bridge between the Schools. The initial invitation would later be supported by the School of Rumanistic Studies through appointments of younger men recommended by Dr. Neugebauer. The Director hoped that a sound pattern might eventually be established by such bonds between two rather remote disciplines."

Weyl assisted Fritz Noether's son, in an endeavor to trace the fate of the father of Emmy and . who had taken refuge in Russia at the time of the Nazi discrimination against Jews. and who, it was known, had been arrested at while at the Research Institute for Mathematics and Mechanics in Tonsk, Siberia, during the purge of 1937. His two sons, Emmy's nephews, were forced to leave Soviet Russia at the time. "Practically nothing of Fritz Noether's fate is known after his arrest late in 1937. The only news came from a physicist who also was arrested in Russia about that time, and many happened to share a prison cell with Fritz in the Butyrka Prison in Moscow in December, 1939. Fritz had been sentenced to 25 years imprison on some silly confession of espionage to which he had been forced under torture. The supposition is that the Russian government turned Noether over to the Gestapo along with many of the German refugees who had fled Germany in 19332, and the presumption is that the Gestapo liquidated Noether as it did many of the others. Although an advertisement was inserted in the British magazine, Nature. no response apparently was ever heard."
