RESOLUTION of the Board of Trustees of the Institute for Advanced Study at the annual meeting of the Corporation and Board, April 23, 1976.

THE BOARD notes with great sorrow the death of Professor Millard Meiss on June 13th, 1975, in his seventy-first year.

MILLARD MEISS came to the Institute in 1958 and served as Professor in the School of Historical Studies until his retirement at the end of June 1974. Although already ill when he retired, Professor Meiss worked with characteristic energy and determination until his last moments. As Professor of art history he maintained the great tradition of his predecessor, Erwin Panofsky, and continued to hold up the international luster of the Institute in the world of art history.

WE join all who knew him in expressing our admiration of him and his accomplishments, and our sympathy with his widow and family in their loss.

Dear Carl:

Here are the schedules that we have been given. The Harper and Row book should be in galley around the 26th of May, and the <u>Vie</u>, for which Elizabeth is in New York today, should be about a month or two later because of the complexity of the printing job (as you can see from the title page and the sample page I am enclosing with this letter).

Elizabeth will leave this Thursday on her long over-due vacation. She badly needs it. We have both worked to the point of exhaustion. She will be back before we have galleys to work on.

On the basis of the schedules we have been given I think you will agree that Elizabeth should begin being being before we reach the index stage. She will be working all summer, after her appointment terminated. I would suggest that she submit a bill after each four weeks of work that I could then O.K. and pass on to Mr. Morgan for payment from the French and Italian Fund. It is not easy to forsee how much time each of the operations, galley, page, and index are going to take, but Elizabeth will surely be working into next fall. When the Fund is exhausted I will meet the bills in some other way.

> If the above proposal does not seem right to you, we can still have Elizabeth write a letter stating what she will do. My main point is that she should not have to wait until index time for payment for wrk that she will have done in the interim. I originally cited the index because that is a separate item and can be estimated, but at that time [thought it could be done during the summer and did not forsee that she would be left without any income whatsoever. As you can see from the schedules, the summer will be devoted to galleys and page proof and only when they are finished can work on the index begin.

This letter is prhaps a bit longwinded, but I hope it is clear and that we can now agree on how the payments from the Fund should be authorized. Would you have any other suggestion?



Dear Carl,

I cannot recall during my years in the School that the problem of the assistant of an emeritus ever came before the School; hence I write to you. If I am incorrect you will set me right.

In any event you predicted correctly a year ago when you said you would not be surprised if I came to you now proposing the same arrangement that has worked so well during the present academic year. It is of course true that the series of problems that has beset me this academic year could not really be foreseen. However, I am recovering well enough, I am back at work, and best of all I am beginning to recover the use of my legs which I had lost during the past two or three months. I expect to return to the office sometime this spring.

The work that lies ahead is just what I described a year ago, except that I have withdrawn from my commitment to deliver the Wrightsman Lectures. This I did with great regret, but it involved a deadline, some intensive periods of preparation, and while I was prepared to inflict this on myself this was the last sort of thing that I would have wished Mig to live through after her experiences since last September. Therefore the tasks are:

1. The completion of the edition of the French text of about 1400 of the Life of Christ, which was widely read and used especially by people who did not read Latin, and thus virtually all the artists. Work on this text, with which Elizabeth Beatson has continued during my absences in New York, is far advanced, and the edition has been accepted for publication as soon as it is ready by the Monograph Series of the College Art Association of America.

2. Coping with whatever changes Harper & Row insist upon in the collection of related papers that I was able to get to them before the fog invaded me extensively. Then there will be proof, etc.

3. The Italian edition of my book on fourteenth-century Italian painting is finally on the track at Einaudi in Torino, and proof will come in the summer or the fall.

Elizabeth Beatson is intimately familiar by now with all these projects and therefore an indispensable helper in the completion of them.

The problem of a permanency implied in continuation here does not arise. She and I have discussed this from time to time and if you require some formal assurance it certainly can be easily obtained.

I knew your attitude towards the sums to be made available to assistants. In view of the inflation I am certain that she would be pleased by some sign of her special competence and devotion to her task.

I propose exactly the same financial arrangement as the past year: in other words, the Fund for French and Italian Painting is responsible for half of her salary.

Conversation between Professor Selberg and Mr. Longstreth in Mr. Pope's office Tuesday, February 23, at 4:15 p.m.

Mr. Longstreth presented his plans for possible Faculty housing in the field across the Selbergs' driveway. Professor Selberg saw no objection to this solution; in fact, he thought it might improve his property in several ways. (1) The field, which is now ploughed and which is an eyesore to him, would look far better. (2) The pollen count might drop. (3) He felt there would be no objection to the houses with the screening that we have shown on the plans. He had no objection to the driveway's taking off from his own drive, provided people did not use his drive as a parking area. Similar letter to Atle Selberg

February 3, 1971

Dear Millard:

You may or may not have heard of the latest maneuvers in the second Battle of Princeton. The long and short of it is that the State now seems serious about taking not just the whole of the Weller Tract, but in due course the houses presently along Mercer Road, the whole of the flood plain of Stony Brook behind the Meeting House and between Mercer Road and Stockton Street, and some of the land the Institute owns on the other side of the Meeting, in order to make a greatly enlarged Battlefield Park. If they in fact decide to do this, I think the Institute will find it difficult to maintain its resistance to parting with all of the Weller Tract.

All this was raised for the first time by Commissioner Sullivan, the State official in charge of these matters, at a meeting I attended yesterday. In the course of that discussion I agreed to look into the possibility that the Institute could use land it now owns other than the Weller Tract for any further Faculty housing that is to be built.

On first examination, the most appropriate alternative site in terms of technical feasibility and location appears to be the field immediately across Selberg's driveway. We will be surveying what the possibilities are in the near future. Any firm decision is some time off, and you will have a full opportunity to comment on whatever plans are proposed in respect to how they would affect your view and other amenities. We will, of course, try to use the contours of the land, the present tree line, and further planting to hold to a minimum any effect in this respect.

I am writing now simply to keep you informed of the state of affairs. I have also written to Atle Selberg, the other of our colleagues who would be most affected by any such construction.
