Memorandum to Professors Cherniss, Dyson, Morse, Panofsky:

I am most grateful to you for your willingness--in some cases at least, at considerable personal sacrifice--to talk with the Trustees when they come here for their annual meeting.

I think it will go best if, for the most part, we talk with the Trustees rather than to them about our present assessment of the problems considered by the Faculty-Trustee Committee of 1956: of the Institute, of things that we have done and of things that we then failed to consider and should have. I do not think any of us needs to come prepared with a speech, though perhaps if we had a point or two it would help elicit questions and start the conversation.

There are two natural times we might have for this talk, which should, I think, last something like an hour and a half or a little longer. One would be 4 o'clock on Friday, the other 10 o'clock Saturday. If none of you has a preference, I should choose the Saturday time; but being greatly in your debt, I shall defer to the merest whisper of preference as to timing.
