AT this rate the seminar for two years would cost about IX \$150,000, over and shove present budget.

This budget contemplates Dodds will take care of McIlwain and Chinard and other members of the Princeton faulty who would experate.

In the letter accompanying the budget, Aydelotte asks whether if the Rockefeller Foundation were willing to provide half of the \$150,000 needed, Mrs. Fuld and Mr. Bamberger would provide the other half. He thinks that the study might begin in February, 1944, but if it began in September, 1944, a good many of the younger members whom he has in mind could apply for Guggenheim Fellowships in October.

Mr. Stewart askedthe Director if he wished to consider long-range plans, and Oppenheimer replied it might be wiser to consider long-range plans at a later date.

Riefler brought up the subject of the monetary seminar "which is operating at a very high level on problems that are now becoming immediate as well as acute. He suggested it might be well to write to the head of the Federal Reserve Board, the head of the International Monetary Fund, and the head of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, suggesting to them that the Institute would be prepared to consider the appointment of members nominated from the staffs of those institutions. The idea is that these younger economists come to Princeton for the full academic year to

work on monetary problems and to participate in the seminar. They would be supported by their institutions. The Institute would, of course, reserve the right to accept or reject nominees."

No action is taken and there is no comment in the minutes which were prepared by Earle.
