She acknowledges receipt of Balletin No. 7 of the Institute, and says it filled her with surprise and "puzzled indignation." She writes personally to inform Pleaner he has made a bad mistake in her judgment in not identifying her work at Tersus with the Institute for Advanced Study. She disabses at hat when her father became "an anonymous donor" with the excavation of Tersus, she does not feel that this precluded identification of the excavation at Tersus with the Institute. She informs Pleaner "when my Father decided no longer to make his gift through Harvard University, I urged him to come forward and make it personally. As all such enterprises must be supported by individuals of means, I saw no reason why he should not be known as part-supporter of mywork. He has, however, always shunned publicity and so, without

in any way consulting me first, he made his offer to the Institute which you accepted. This...seemed to me appropriate that the Institute at which I am professor should be connected with what is and will remain for a number of years my chief interest and occupation. It is true that my Father stipulated that his name should not be mentioned, but I feel quite sure that he made no stipulation that the connection of the Institute with Tarsus should remain equally anonymous."

She notes also that the grant to Miss Day for study at Tarsus Islamic caramics was made before she left Princeton, and though other holders of grants are specifically mentioned, her appointment too max is passed over. She cannot imagine that the Bulletin is hastily written. She writes in all friendliness, etc.

Her letter is acknowledged on May 18, 1938 by Miss Bailey who explains that only the material was embedded in the Bulk tin which Miss Goldman, herself, submitted, and that this issue was not raised at that time.

In reply to her letter of May 3, 1938, on the attribution to the Institute of her excavations at Tarsus. "I do not know precisely how to reply to your subsequent letter of May 3, to which Mrs. Bailey replied on May 18. Nothing would have given me more pleasure than to make any reference to your father or Tarsus that would please you and him, but he himself insisted on anonymity and therefore let me, as I thought, no alternative. As to an account of your work at Tarsus, I said nothing because you yourself, in reply to my request for a statement for the bulletin, made no specific mention of Tarsus. As Mps. Bailey indicated, the annual bulletin is meant to be a modest statement by the professors themselves of what they are doing or planning. My part is wholly editorial, and even my editorial work is limited to piecing together the fragmentary statements which I receive in answer to my inquiries. I cannot therefore

"...mathematicians are doing still more astounding things and have actually something like 75 members in mathematics and mathematical physics coming this year. The result is, of course, that the Institute is impossibly crowded. Would you have any objection to one or two people working in your room until such time as you return when they could be removed to the library. The whole question of emeritus members (which class I join on October 16) is getting to be a little embarrassing, in view of the unprecedented demands on Institute space. I have established myself in Lowe's quarters in a quite small room which

Gil Stott and I share. I did not want to be in the position of occupying a large space. At the same time, I feel very strongly that the Institute would lose a lot if it did not provide dignified quarters for members emeritus, and I intend to maintain that point im of view vigorously in the meetings of the Board of Trustees. Of course, the only real thing to do is to build some additional buildings with small rooms for members; and meanwhile we must just get on as best we can, but I think it is desirable to allow temporary use of any room that may be vacant."

He notes that the School of Humanistic Studies is doing well.

Homer Thompson is on the job, "and tomorrow we are presenting for the second time to the faculty the nomination of Cherniss." Previously Miss Goldman has thanked Dr. Aydelotte for the successful arrangements with Datus Smith at the Princeton Press for the publication of her book.
