



TO MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The attached Budget Analysis is presented in a changed format in response to requests to show more clearly the net operating loss and major elements of income and expense.

The first column is the actual fiscal year 1978 results from operations and agrees to the Audit Report. Column two is the budget approved by the Trustees for the current year and column three is our best estimate of expenditures and revenues to June 30, 1979. Column four is our projected needs for fiscal year 1980.

The Operating Expenses for FY '80 are down from FY '79 mainly because the Einstein Symposium was a one year perturbation to the budget. We also incurred some non-capital major maintenance in FY '79 such as the extensive painting of Fuld Hall and the repairs to the Library roof that will not be repeated in FY '80.

The increase in benefits represents an improvement in our benefits program to become more competitive with other institutions. Retirement contributions are increased to 15% of base salary; group life insurance is increased to 1-1/2 times base salary from \$25,000 for faculty and \$10,000 for staff; and medical insurance premium payments are set at 2/3 IAS, 1/3 employee contribution from a previous program that allowed nothing for the faculty and a payment of, or equivalent to, single coverage for a staff person.



A review of the minutes of the various Trustee committees and of the October meeting of the Board reveals several outstanding requests for information. We will want to be in a position to satisfy these requests by mid-April.

1. A new budget presentation, designed to show clearly operating income, operating expenses, and the resulting deficit.
2. A projection of actual cafeteria operating costs and revenues so that the extent of the subsidy this year and next can be determined.
3. A more carefully refined set of support costs for Members, so that the true cost of a stipend in each individual case can be determined. (See separate memo on this subject.)
4. At the April 29, 1978, meeting of the Board, it was decided to establish a life trust pooled income fund account, and a sum of \$500,000 was voted to initiate the program at the Fidelity Bank. Could you please check to find out if all of this is in proper order?
5. Howard Petersen has asked for a written review of Institute mortgage policy. I assume that a revised policy will appear along with other items in the proposed new benefits package.
6. Ralph Hansmann has asked for a written review of our policy and actions with regard to insurance.

In response to the request made at the October meeting of the Board of Trustees, we will need in advance of the April meeting a detailed presentation on this year's Members by Schools, showing what is paid to each in the form of a stipend and, in a separate column, in the form of academic support.

This is designed to show several things, including stipend levels in the four Schools, average academic support costs per Member, overall Institute expenditure on Members on an annual basis, and the competitive position of our stipends. Additional items of importance are how much each School contributes to its own costs through grants and through income from its restricted funds, and how much the Members in the various Schools bring with them by way of stipend support.

In order to show this material comparatively, it would be useful to show salary scales at a limited number of major universities, and stipend levels from a small number of institutions which provide stipends on a regular basis (Guggenheim, ACLS, NEH, NSF).



Dear Harry:

Although you will get a flood of testimonials about the memorable qualities of your Einstein festival, I believe that you should be already exuberant about the initial events. Frances and I enjoyed enormously being with you all on Sunday evening. Once more I could say that never in the history of the Institute as we have known it, which is nearly all of its span, has there been a greater sense of community, of congeniality, and of deep understanding. This encompassed also a sense of common purpose and of appreciation for what Einstein and the science and scholarship he symbolizes means to humankind.

Besides that, we had the joy of seeing friends and associates under the most amiable hosting of the Woolfs. Your gracious acceptance of us at your table was altogether delightful. In the very theme of extending common interests, which in fact Einstein enjoyed and pursued steadily, we enjoyed all at your festive board. Frances liked Dr. Regge and the Italian officials so much and had also a lively visit with our old friend, Phil Handler, at that end of the table. Correspondingly, at our end, not only Mr. Petersen and Mrs. Wolfensohn but Herr Schmude, and next to me, Herr Lüst, had many mutual interests with us. Indeed, Herr Lüst and I formed a whole new set of bonds. His responsibility for the Max Planck Institutes, for which, as you know, the Institute for Advanced Study is such an admirable example, embodies one of the few independent research administrations in Europe. We interacted on all sorts of new

physics and some related fields. You will have advanced the whole frontier of international endeavor by that adjacency at dinner!

But every moment of Sunday evening was cherished. As a fledgling student, I had come to know I. Rabi and Eugene Wigner just short of forty-four years ago. Then, I had the privilege of working with them steadily from the War years on through their gradual retirement eight or ten years ago. To rejoin them under the warm friendships that you fostered with them and other close colleagues like Ed Purcell, Bram Pais, Milton White, and, of course, my own associates Arno Penzias, John Klauder, and a host of others was just the nicest thing that could have happened to us, in being allowed to pay respects to A. Einstein.

Further, the special quality of the gathering and of the program to follow benefited from the perspectives that both you and Mrs. Woolf possess. This is just the time when science and scholarship should be aware of centennials and other anniversaries--when they should view themselves in relation to the other sweeps of human endeavor and not as separate compartmented matters. Your distinguished predecessor, Robert Oppenheimer, whom we knew so well, would have been charmed and heartened by this aspect of your presence and the nature of the Einstein gathering. Because of increasing specialization of science, he despaired of its cognition of other realms, but your influence, as well as the nature of the Institute, is modulating that hazard significantly.

So I hope that you will recognize how worthily and effectively all has been structured in honor of Einstein and, indeed, of the community of nations that he served. I went to my serious Washington assignments in delicate levels of national security at 6:00a.m. Monday morning with a heightened sense of responsibilities we all have to carry to forward the ideals you had so well represented there. I go back to Washington at 6:00 o'clock this morning, to the Senate Committee on Science, with an especially sharpened resolve to speak out in every possible way in behalf of those ideals in their scientific embodiments.

But I do look forward to being with you all still later this week. And your many courtesies to Frances and me were an unforgettable feature of Sunday. Phil Handler and I agreed early in the evening that, nevertheless mindful of our decades of effort in the National Academy to develop a sense of history and of fellowship in the world science community, your program at the Institute fully warranted our decision to have no parallel Einstein activity in Washington. You just have done the right things in the right way, as of course you would, but you have given a lot of joy as well.
