He has read what was apparently a report by Aydelotte on the proposed study for the School of Economics and Politics. The gravamen of this question is apparently whether planning can work within a democrary without destroying the democrary. Moe cites Hayek in Roads to Serfdom, and thinks Hayek makes his case.

Moe cites talks with Lewis Lorwin who doesn't accept the Hayek thesis. His book, Time for Planning, is to be published shortly by Harpers.

"Having made the above suggestion, I need to say further rhat a suggestion like this seems to me to raise the whole

question of the function of the Director, and, indeed, of the Board of Trustees in an organization such as the Institute for Advanced Study. Obviously, if Stewart and Warren and Riefler don't want to undertake such a study they don't have to. It would also not be feasible for the Trustees of the Institute to go out and hire a bunch of scholars to make the study. I think this kind of question is pertinent material for your report and that is the reason I mention it at this time. Ferhaps the only answer is that the Director can try to be persuasive if he wants scatching done but if the staff does not want to do it, there is nothing be can do about it.

"I am far from saying, you understand--I am not arrogant, I hope--that I think that the economics staff of the Institute ought to drop everything else and tackle this problem. The problem is the largest politice-economic problem I see but I know that I don't see as broadly or as deeply as Stewart and warren do into such matters. I have no ideas in the field that I would not subordinate to their dissent."

Thanks Moe and ease that he has said what he has to say on Planning and Democracy in The Academic Lock Step. Also he circulated Hayek's book before it was published among our economists.

He thinks the question is one not of economics but of philosophy and is delighted to see our economists broadening into philosophical studies.

He thinks the job of the Director is to release the creative energies in other men and to facilitate by discussion and in other ways the projects which excite their enthusiasm.

There is an unsent letter signed by Aydelotte dated October 13, 1944, in the same file alluding to the danger of reporting to the Trustees before his plans are fully matured, and also to his American Civilization Study.

D. subjects assigned for the mental exercise and not for the usefulness.

"Scholars of superior ability ege impatient of such cinic, and a certain number of men who come here/to be persuaded that what they are doing is not worth while, and that they should undertake comething with of greater significance in the world of scholarship. The result is that

residence at the Institute sometimes prevents men from publishing these little footnotes to history and to science of which our learned publications are so full and which applicants for Guggenheim Fellowships often list at such great length."

Orthodox scholars and plodders hate these larger problems.

He discusses a number of such ideas which he says he has been discussing with various members of the Faculty for several years: (1) A Seminar on democracy and planning, or perhaps on philosophical aspects of economics which would include question of profit vs. power as an economic motive. (2) Seminar on economic and political phenomena of classical times having a bearing on today. Nothing sensational, but a discussion of many problems, social, political, and economic of the ancient world which are "as Bob Warren says, as modern as Walter Lippmann.

(3) American civilization study concerning economics, classics, history, politics and the history of science with application to the teeching problem which all colleges and universities will face immediately after the war.

It is requested that all communications in response to this letter be sent to me so that everything may be in one channel.

The enclosed letter to the faculty reads as follows: "To the Faculty of the Institute for Advanced Study:

"The Trustees of the Institute for Agranced Study have named a committee of Trustees (Dr. Aydelotte, Mr. Douglas, Dr. Pulton, Mr. Leidesdorf, Mr. Masse, Mr. Schaap and myself) in reference to the appointment of a director of the Institute to succeed Dr. Aydelotte upon his retirement. The function of the committee is, of course, simply advisory to the Board of Trustees; for no Board can in any way delegate ultimate responsibility for the appointment of its principal executive officer.

At the first meeting of the committee I was instructed to ask members of the Institute's Faculty to suggest persons who should be considered for the directorship. We desire that all members of the Faculty shall be heard upon the subject. It is left to the Faculty to decide in what way these suggestions shall be arrived at: the committee is equally ready to consider one letter from the Faculty as a whole or individual letters from each member of the Faculty, or communications based on any procedure between these two extremes.

"The deliberations and negotiations preceding the appointment of a director of the Institute are matters of great delicacy.

Members of the Faculty will realize the importance to the welfare of the Institute of confining discussion of this subject to the Faculty and the Board of Trustees, and of keeping it strictly confidential so far as the outside world is concerned.

"It is requested that all communications in response to this letter be sent to me, so that everything on this subject may be in one place for the committee's consideration. During the period of its deliberations the committee will be glad to confer with individual members of the Faculty or with a committee representing the Faculty as a whole.

"There seems to be no point in having any discussion of qualifications in the abstract. The Faculty's idea of qualifications will be apparent in your suggestions, as will be this committee's in its recommendations and Frustees' in their choice."
